Dean's Message

Volunteerism – Opportunities, Resources and the Annual Day of Service

YSPH Colleagues,

In these times of high public health energy, urgency and anxiety, I am truly inspired by your collective spirit.

Members of our community embody the mission of public health. Not the least of your efforts is that of volunteerism. You are working with our health departments in contact tracing, our university in phone banking, our school in researching and writing for our multiple constituencies, and our social service agencies delivering food to our neighbors, phone-tutoring students, and reaching out to isolated shut-in individuals. <u>YSPH is engaged in a national</u>

community health worker training initiative.

Our researchers are providing forecasting and policy guidance and are researching the virus and its immunologic impact. We are helping our partners in Africa and Asia prepare for their outbreaks, even as we have received guidance from our Chinese colleagues based on their earlier experiences. Clinicians in the school are working side-by-side with their YSM counterparts in patient care.

Most importantly, we are supporting each other through the loss of loved ones, professional colleagues and community members. The need continues in the New Haven area and across the globe, so I write today with ongoing opportunities, resources and an announcement about our annual Day of Service in May.

There are two portals available for volunteer opportunities in the local <u>Greater New Haven</u> <u>community</u>. The first is through the United Way of Greater New Haven. The second is through <u>NewHavenHelpWithCovid.com</u>, a New Haven-wide volunteer management platform created by Yale students where Yale, local university students and residents of New Haven can apply for on-site or remote COVID-19 volunteer positions, and where local non-profits and government can recruit and onboard volunteers quickly. You can also follow it on <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u>, or sign up for the <u>newsletter</u> to receive updates on the latest openings.

Specifically for students interested in community service learning and applied practice experience, a new resource section has been created with SAYPH's counsel on the <u>myYSPH</u> <u>COVID</u> site. If you would like to donate for food or other compelling community needs, here is one option, in the words of President Salovey, "[Yale] will fully match every dollar given by faculty, students, and staff up to our \$5 million goal. The fund will be managed by Yale's Office of New Haven Affairs. To contribute to this fund, <u>here's the link.</u>"

With deep regret, we must cancel this year's YSPH Day of Service, scheduled previously for Monday, May 11, 2020. In lieu of hands-on activities, virtual projects are being offered through the <u>Yale Alumni Association (YAA)</u>. The YAA is also planning a <u>digital gathering on Saturday, May</u> <u>9th</u> for the global service community, with details still being finalized. I look forward to our 2021 YSPH Day of Service in person!

For most of us, however, each and every day is a new Yale Day of Service in this time of public health crisis. Stay engaged and virtually connected. Physical distancing and social cohesion are our goals!

Sustainability: BYO for all at YSPH? - We need your vote!

We understand it may seem odd to share this survey amidst the COVID-19 public health crisis, but we don't want the <u>50th</u> <u>Anniversary of Earth Day</u> (April 22) to slip by while climate change is still a looming priority. This year's theme is Climate Action – and we propose YSPH take bold action by becoming a BYO leader by eliminating single-use plastics and other items from catered events. <u>Share your vote</u> in under two minutes!

Why?: Global plastics production has quadrupled over the past four decades. With the boom in fracked oil and natural gas—raw materials for plastics manufacturing—and the resultant oil and gas glut, fossil fuel companies are aggressively building new plastics manufacturing plants, with a projection that plastics production will grow 3.5 percent to 4 percent yearly through at least 2035. This growth, along with the ubiquity of toxic singleuse plastics, has grave implications for public health, the environment (especially biodiversity) and climate change (plastics = large carbon footprint). The Yale School of Public Health can become a model for the university and for other schools of public health by developing and implementing policies to eliminate single-use plastics (and other single-use items) at catered events.

Emily Davidson, second year Ph.D. student in a combined degree program with EHS and Cellular & Molecular Physiology, received a three-year grant for \$138,000 Her research is investigating the role of glutathione biosynthesis in mechanisms of insulin secretion from the pancreatic beta-cell.

Ana Rosen-Vollmar, fourth year Ph.D. student in public health, EHS, received a two-year dissertation grant for \$75,931. Her research is on the effect of phenol exposure on reproductive function and the urinary metabolome.

Phoebe Tran, fourth year Ph.D. student in public health, CDE,

received a three-year dissertation grant for \$121,445. Her research is on the influence of air pollution on 2014-2015 national-, regional-, and state-level ischemic stroke hospitalization and 30-day, all-cause hospital readmission in older adults in the United States.



He gets pre-tax bus passes through <u>Yale's Commuter</u> <u>Benefits Program</u> (scroll to Transit Commuting), making it that much more convenient and cost-effective. When he bikes, he takes the Farmington Canal trail to campus and then a bike lane on High Street. Commuting by bus or bike provides eco-conscious ways for Forrest to get to work with relative ease and without the headache of having to find or pay for parking!


Assistant Professor **Nicole Deziel** has been named to the National Academies of Sciences Standing Committee on Emerging Science for Environmental Health Decisions.
